\$1,000 Scholarship Is Up for Grabs!!

Whitepine Grange wants to give a \$1,000 scholarship to a local 2025 high school senior to use for trade school or college this fall, but so far nobody seems to want it. To date, we have no applicants!

The deadline for applying is April 15.

The winning candidate must be a Whitepine Grange member, or have a member in the immediate family. (A membership, by the way, is \$35. Application for membership is on the last page of this newsletter.) He or she must have a trade school or college career path chosen that will in



some way relate to agriculture. Since "agriculture" touches just about all occupations in some way, this requirement covers a lot of bases, from farrier school to flying, from environmental studies to civil engineering.

The complete application packet for a Whitepine Grange scholarship can be found at the Whitepine Grange website: www.whitepinegrange.com. Go to the "About" page and scroll to the bottom of the page; you will find all the information in a downloadable form.

If you know someone who could use \$1,000 for further education in the fall, get them first to join Whitepine Grange—just fill out the form on page 8 and send it in with a check for \$35. Next, fill out the application and get it returned to the Grange by April 15.

If only one person does this and fills out the application with care, that person has a great chance of winning \$1,000 for school in the fall. It pays to join your local Grange!

If you've ever tried to find a licensed plumber or HVAC expert on short notice in Sanders County, you know the problem. We have a trade brain drain here, which leaves us groveling for the expensive option of importing these pros from Missoula and other far-away places.

Let's grow our own! It's time to push our young people (and even older unemployed people with currently unmarketable skills) toward trade schools. Consider these good reasons:

- 1. Enhanced job opportunities
- 2. Hands-on training
- 3. Fast track to graduation
- 4. High earning potential
- 5. Flexibility and cost effectiveness

There are nearly 10,000 trade schools within the United States, all of which offer various degree paths for students to choose from, such as welding,



plumbing, HVAC, diesel technology, and more. Compared to a more traditional university degree, students are more likely to end up with a job lined up before graduation, spend less on tuition, and secure a quicker return on investment.

Trade school grads are more valued—and better compensated—than a four-year college grad who majors in something like gender studies, cannabis biology, or puppet arts!

With our new government administration putting more emphasis on U.S. production and decreasing dependence on global sources, the time is ripe for American youngsters to be learning skills that will help strengthen our country from within. Let's encourage our high school grads to discover trades that will pay us all dividends for life. The possibilities for successful, fulfilling careers



are endless!

Fitness expert to demonstrate unique workout routine at next meeting

The Whitepine Grange monthly meeting on Tues., March **25,** will feature a unique program presented by local fitness expert Francois Comunetti.

The public is invited to attend the program, free of charge, which will begin at 6:30pm.

Comunetti, who hails originally from Switzerland, is in his 60s and in the best shape of his life, he says. For the past 25 years he's been faithfully practicing a short physical fitness workout daily that he says helped him survive a severe horse accident at his home in Trout Creek in 2024.

The best thing about his workout routine, patterned after a program called "The Peaceful Warrior," is that anyone can do it...and it takes as little as four minutes per day. The exercises can be adapted for all ages and capabilities.

Now a full-time farmer in Trout Creek, Comunetti has a vast background of training and instructing in judo and other martial arts.

His program on March 25 will begin with a movie trailer of "Way of the Warrior," the story of athlete Dan Millman who recovered from a debilitating accident and went on to become a world class athlete by following the "Peaceful Warrior" program.

Comunetti aspires to get more men into a regular program that will help them enjoy life for years to come. He will be offering classes again at the Grange in the near future.



For several week starting in January, Sue met with four students at the Grange on Monday afternoons, where she taught the neophyte knitters how to cast on, knit, purl, cast off, and follow a knitting pattern. Sue provided the materials and fostered her students' addiction to the sport of knitting. Now these eager new knitters are spending a lot of time away from their daily obligations and choosing to use that time creating hats, scarves and shawls of beautiful wool. As Sue predicted at the start of her class, "You're going to find yourselves saying to your husbands, 'Yes, honey, just let me finish this row first!'"

Sue has offered to teach another class at the Grange in the fall or winter, when weather ends outdoor summer activities and folks are ready to sit once again indoors by a warm fire.



A 3-hour class on grant-finding and grant-writing for your nonprofit organizations

- How to set up a tax-exempt 501.c.3 organization.
- How to find small grants up to \$30,000 from corporations and foundations.
- How to fill out a grant application.

This class is for anyone who works for a nonprofit or is considering starting one up. It deals with modest grants available from foundations and corporations, It does NOT deal with grants from government entities.

Since 2020, Jan Manning's nonprofit "Friends of Whitepine Grange" has won 25 grants totaling nearly \$99,000 in grant money to be used for the improvements and programs of Whitepine Grange #102. These grants have varied in size from \$328 to \$12,500. Jan Manning is neither an attorney nor a tax specialist, but she will share her effective and successful methods with other "non-experts" in this class.
